# UPCOMING MEMBERSHIP MEETING (20 Jan 24) National Security

The January 20, 2024 Chapter meeting will feature

Christopher (Chris) Miller (Lt Gen, USAF, Ret) providing an update to the war in Ukraine (follow on to December 2022 membership



meeting presentation) plus his perspectives on the ongoing conflict between Israel and Hamas.

Chris Miller last served on active duty as the Air Force's deputy chief of staff for strategic plans and programs, leading the Air Force's multi-billion, five-year program formulation and longer-range planning efforts. In his current work at the Air Force Academy's Center for Character & Leadership Development, he is the inaugural Arizona State University Helen and Arthur E. Johnson Chair for the Study of the Profession of Arms. In this capacity, he is exploring the impact of increasingly complex missions and newly contested domains on the nature and cohesion of the military profession, its boundaries and its relationship with civil society.

In his over 33 years of service he has led planning, policy, and strategy for U.S. Northern Command & NORAD (responsible for homeland defense, civil support, and security cooperation with Mexico and Canada); served as the senior USAF commander on the ground in Afghanistan; commanded the nation's only B-2 bomber wing; directed personnel assignments for 340,000 officer and enlisted Airmen; was defense policy adviser to the U.S. ambassador to NATO, a military fellow at the Council on Foreign Relations in New York, and an analyst and planner at Headquarters US Air Force. He commanded flying units at squadron, group and wing levels and has over 3300 flying hours in T-38, B-1, B-2 and other military and civilian aircraft. General Miller was a distinguished graduate of the U.S. Air Force Academy and of the College of Naval Command and Staff and holds an M.Phil. in International Relations from Oxford University. He is President of the North American chapter of the International Society for Military Ethics, immediate past President of the Air Force Historical Foundation, a director of the Academy Research and Development Institute, and a member of the Council on Foreign Relations. From 2018 to 2021, he served as the Presidentiallyappointed Chair of the US Section, Permanent Joint Board on Defense, US-Canada.



lead other Cadets. A major component of the JROTC leadership and citizenship program is female Cadets. Female Cadets make up 40% of the Cadet population. The JROTC faculty is led by nearly 4,000 instructors who are retired from active duty, reserve duty, or National Guard Army service. Instructors are trained and qualified in accordance with the National Defense Authorization Act 2007 to teach and mentor approximately 314,000 JROTC Cadets annually. #### JROTC/ROTC

**Army Junior ROTC Program Overview** 

The U.S. Army Junior Reserve Officers' Training Corps (JROTC) is one of the largest character development and citizenship programs for youth in the world. The National Defense Act of 1916 established organized JROTC programs at public and private educational institutions. In 1964, Congress expanded the program to all military services and changed from active duty to shared support from the services and schools. As congressionally mandated by Title 10 United States Code, Section 2031, each military service must have a JROTC program to "instill in students in United States secondary educational institutions the values of citizenship, service to the United States, and personal responsibility and a sense of accomplishment." JROTC's mission, "To Motivate Young People to be Better Citizens", is the guide post for the program's success.



The U.S. Army's JROTC program currently operates in more than 1,700 public and private high schools, military institutions, and correctional centers throughout the United States and overseas.

Approximately 40% of JROTC programs are in inner city schools, serving a student population of 50% minorities. As JROTC students (Cadets) progress through the program, they experience opportunities to

#### NATIONAL SECURITY (NS)

Cyber Direct Commissioning Program (CDCP) Recognizing shortage of Cyber Security professionals, the Army and Air Force (reserve and National Guard) components have a new tool – the CDCP authorized in the 2021 National Defense Authorization Act. Provides opportunity for civilians to enter the military removing barriers that may turn eligible cyber security professionals from service, and accelerate those that get selected into the officer ranks with rank and pay commensurate to their actual experience levels. CDCP is designed to tap talented individuals outside the traditional military pipeline. This initiative selects highly qualified subject matter experts to fill the ranks of Lieutenant to Colonel to meet mission needs utilizing constructive service credit. Individuals must meet basic requirements for eligibility to join the direct commissioning track. The CDCP aims to attract people with cyber-related civilian work experience and graduate degrees. Applicants must meet basic officer eligibility requirements and possess demonstrated cybersecurity or cyber operations expertise through advanced academic degrees, relevant industry experience, or professional certifications. The Cyber Direct Commissioning Program aims to add more cyber professionals to the military (active, reserve and Guard) and provide them with a direct pathway to success. By allowing individuals to start their military careers without completing a lengthy commissioning process, the program hopes to recruit the next generation of cybersecurity professionals. #### **SCOUTING**

As previously mentioned in the newsletter in the Homeland Security section was reference to the Girl Scouts and their initiatives in Cybersecurity. See this <u>link</u> for the 2020 report by the Girl Scout Research Institute "Breaking the Firewall" Enhancing safety in a digital world by bringing more girls and women into cybersecurity." Included in this report are the various badges from Daisy (Grades K-1), Brownie (Grades 2-3), Junior (Grades 4-5), Cadette (Grades 6-8), Senior Badges (Grades 9-10), and Ambassador Badges (Grades 11-12). At Daisy the girls learn cybersecurity basics including learning about computer parts and how computers are connected. At Ambassador girls are Cybersecurity Investigator badge where they investigate and respond when a fictional city has been affected by a cyberattack. Kudos to the Girl Scouts for embracing the need for educating girls and women on cybersecurity.

#### **VETERAN'S AFFAIRS**

Colorado's Draft Digital Access Plan is Available for Public Comment

With the passage of the federal Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act, every state is required to develop a Digital Equity State Plan (known as the Digital Access Plan) which explores access to affordable broadband and digital devices as well as digital skill levels and cybersecurity practices for eight covered populations:

- Low-income households
- Aging populations
- Incarcerated individuals
- Veterans
- People with disabilities
- People with language barriers
- Racial and ethnic minorities
- Rural inhabitants

Within the plan, each state is required to then define measurable objectives that would address the digital divide for these populations. Companion Rich Peters is facilitating a listening session at Mt. Carmel on

#### Special Features/Humor/Trivia

Korean Defense Service Medal (KDSM) is an example of a military award that you are eligible for after you have either separated or retired.

#### **BACKGROUND**

The Department of Defense approved the Korean Defense Service Medal in February 2004 to be given as recognition for military service in the Republic of Korea and the surrounding waters after July 28, 1954 and ending on such a future date as determined by the Secretary of Defense.

#### **CRITERIA**

Individuals must have been assigned, attached, or mobilized to units operating or serving on all the land area of the Republic of Korea, and the contiguous waters out to 12 nautical miles, and all airspace above the stated land and water areas. To be eligible for the KDSM, personnel must have been physically present in the stated areas for 30 consecutive or 60 nonconsecutive days, or must meet one of the following:

- -Be engaged in actual combat during an armed engagement, regardless of the time in the areas of eligibility
- -Be killed, wounded, or injured in the line of duty and required medical evacuation from the area of eligibility
- -While participating as a regularly assigned aircrew member flying sorties into, out of, within, or over the area of eligibility in support of military operations. Each day that one or more sorties are flown in accordance with these criteria shall count as 1 day toward the 30-or 60-day requirement.

Next month's newsletter will present process for updating your military records if you are eligible for the KDSM.
