Our COS MOWW presenters were impressed with the quality and standards of the cadets we saw at these events and are proud to report that our nation will be in good hands for years to come.

At a most memorable JROTC awards ceremony at Canon City, Colorado, both the female cadet battalion commander and the male cadet executive officer wept openly as they thanked and bid farewell to their Senior Army instructors. Sergeant First Class Paul Vertrees, US Army retired, was described as a 'living legend' at Canon City High School, having spent over two decades managing the JROTC program and mentoring over 1,000 young citizen students including his own three children. The cadet battalion executive officer admitted that he was "not a good kid" but Chief Warrant Officer 2 Steven Klein, US Army retired, saw something in him and challenged him to join JROTC and become a leader. He personally thanked CW2 Klein for mentoring him over four years, helping him to achieve a HAM radio license, and applauded him as "a second father to me and a man to whom I owe my success in life".
