MAY MEMBERSHIP MEETING (19 APR) Public Safety/Law and Order

The Colorado Springs (COS), Colorado Chapter of MOWW was honored to host El Paso County, Colorado Sheriff Joe Roybal at our 22 May 2025 Companions Meeting. As a guest of our Law and Order Committee, Sheriff Roybal provided valuable information on how citizens can become a part of the effort to protect our local communities and assist our local law enforcement professionals. He also discussed some high-profile operations throughout the community that required cooperation between a host of law enforcement agencies and professionals. Recently, a large-scale operation led by the El Paso Sheriff's Office involving Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE), the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI), and the Colorado Springs Police Department shut down

a "pop-up" night club which led to the detainment of over 100 illegal immigrants as well as confiscation of firearms, drugs, and other prohibited items.

NATIONAL SECURITY (NS)

The "Golden Dome" refers to a proposed multilayered missile defense system for the United States, designed to protect the country from a variety of threats, including ballistic, hypersonic, and cruise missiles. It envisions a global network of satellites equipped with sensors and interceptors, capable of detecting and destroying incoming missiles in space and during their flight. Limited Seating: The Citizens Academy has limited seating, and applications are accepted on a first-come, first-served basis.

No Cost: There is no charge to attend the Citizens Academy.

Requirements: Applicants must pass a standard background check.

El Paso County Sheriff's Posses: The Sheriff's Posse is a citizen-based volunteer program which allows residents to engage in law enforcement-related duties which do not require a sworn deputy. Some duties include:

- Accident and traffic control
- Crime scene security
- Crowd and traffic management for special events
- Directed patrol, crime prevention, and alarm response
- Parking complaints and vehicle impounds
- Animal complaints and lost/found property reports
- Motorist assists
- Assisting the Communications Center, Sheriff's Office front desk, Courthouse, or other county buildings

VETERANS AFFAIRS

"Stolen valor" refers to falsely claiming military service or awards to gain personal benefit, prestige, or recognition. It



involves lying about military service, exaggerating achievements, or wearing military attire and medals without authorization. This behavior is considered disrespectful to those who have genuinely served in the military and can be a crime depending on the intent and the law.

We want to recognize Companion Mike McGrath (CAPT, USN, Ret) a six-year Vietnam Prisoner of War (POW) in the "Hanoi Hilton" for his 25-year battle with the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) to

reconcile possible Stolen Valor issues associated with individuals falsely claiming POW status. The Stars and Stripes recently published an article on May 19 titled VA's growing roll of veterans getting POW benefits scrutinized by those once held captive. The article documents (link to article)



Mike's 25-year journey to identify veterans claiming POW status who are provided VA benefits reserved for POWs. (See this link for article.) Mike serves as the historian for the nonprofit NAM-POWs (<u>link</u> to website), where he serves as historian. The following are the numbers he maintains of the POWs in recent conflicts compared to the VA's numbers:

While the VA is often referred to as the "VA," the official name is the Department of Veterans Affairs. Name change occurred when the Veterans Administration was elevated to a cabinet-level department in 1988 and renamed the Department of Veterans Affairs in 1989. The current, **official name** of the department is the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs. The VA provides a wide range of services for veterans and their families, including healthcare, benefits, and burials.


The Lufbery Award is presented annually in memory of Major Gervais Raoul Victor Lufbery (14 March 1885 –19 May 1918), a French and American fighter
